

The most important thing when planning your dog's photo shoot is that they should always feel comfortable and happy

Are they safe and secure?

Do they feel relaxed and at ease?

Are they happy and can have fun?

The location is vitally important when planning your shoot.

Ask yourself:

- Does it need to be in an enclosed area?
   Does it need to be far from a road?
  - Does it need to be quiet with not many other dogs or people?
    - Does it need to be close to where we park?





Once you have figured out where your dog will be comfortable and happy you can then turn to think about what sort of setting you would like for the images - that is, unless it isn't already obvious given your dog's likes and dislikes.

THE WINTER MONTHS can be a bit sparse on the pretty flowers and foliage front, but on the other hand beaches look the same all year round. The obvious issue with beaches is the colder water so if your dog loves to swim perhaps wait for it to warm up a bit. Places like Dartmoor in Devon look amazing in the winter, a bit moody and dramatic. Yes it's colder in the winter but some of the skies take some beating and locations are often much quieter than in warmer weather. Plus you have the bonus of dog beach bans being much less common in winter. Sunrise shoots a lot easier too!

THE SPRING MONTHS (in theory) are when it feels a bit warmer and things start to grow again. I like this time of year because flowers start to come out and parks start to look a bit more interesting again. Decidous trees start getting their eaves again and countryside locations look a bit more luscious. Beaches are of course still great locations in the spring. The added benefit of this time of year are the later sunsets, meaning I can meet people after work in the week. My shoots generally take place either at sunrise or a couple of hours before sunset.

THE SUMMER MONTHS are mostly a lot warmer so we have to think about dogs not overheating. I generally meet peope a couple of hours before sunset, so this is generally not a problem but it's an important consideration. I love the wild flowers in the summer and with the warmer waters dogs can have great fun in rivers and the sea. Everything looks pretty lush but it's just very, very bright for most of the day so it's important to meet in the evening to get the best light. Places are a lot busier and there are more crowds/dog beach bans in place so less flexibility there.

THE AUTUMN MONTHS means kids back in school so locations a lot quieter. Beginning of October usually means dogs are allowed back on most beaches so we have much more space to play with. It's less hot but the water still warmer. Woods really come into their own at this time of year with the oranges, yellows reds of the leaves. It's a beautiful time of year, really peaceful and beautiful but still fairly warm. Sunset times start to get earlier again and so flexibility in meeting people in the week, as well as weekends becomes less.
